5	meeting of the 22nd District Agricultural Association. I am
6	president Joyce Rowland and I am calling the meeting to order
7	and asking for our roll call.
8	MS. O'LEARY: President Rowland.

24	PRESIDENT JOYCE ROWLAND: Okay. We will move to our
25	Consent Calendar, which does have action items, including the

minutes and some contract approvals. But on that list for some 1 2. items that are still out for bid, sometimes they get 3 calendared, in case the information comes in in a timely 4 fashion; but in this case, there are three items on the list 5 that were not ready for the meeting. So 23-031, generator 6 maintenance repair, the 23-032, heavy equipment rental, and the 23-008, golf cart rental, are all coming off of the contract approvals for standard agreements. 8 And any questions from the members of the board 9 10 or any request to move items off of Consent Calendar? 11 Okay. Seeing none, we have one member of the 12 public who has signed up to speak on the Consent Calendar, and 13 that's Martha Sullivan. 14 MARTHA SULLIVAN: Hello. Good afternoon. This is Martha Sullivan. And I'm confused reviewing the board packet 15 16 because 23-034 for fair street banner printing is in this -- on 17 this consent calendar, and also 23-040, are the sole source for 18 fair street banner installations. But these are also listed 19 under Item 4 and say they are still out. Now, the fair street banner installation is a 20 21 different number. Are there multiple contracts for fair street 22 banner installation, and one is sole source and the other is out for bid? 23 24 PRESIDENT JOYCE ROWLAND: Do you want to go ahead and 25 address that?

1	MS. MOORE: Yes. These are actually two separate
2	contracts, and that is because in some cities where we do the
3	community banner program, those cities have their own
4	contractors for the installation of the banners. That's why
5	those are the sole source contract for those particular cities.
6	MARTHA SULLIVAN: Okay.
7	MS. MOORE: For other cities
8	MARTHA SULLIVAN: Okay. That's good enough.
9	MS. MOORE: we are we had to go to bid for the
10	service, and that's why there are two separate contracts for
11	what appears to be the same service.
12	MARTHA SULLIVAN: Got you.
13	And what about the fair street banner printing,
14	which is in both items; 23-034?
15	Hello?
16	PRESIDENT JOYCE ROWLAND: Yes. She's looking at it.
17	Where do you see it under Item 4?
18	MARTHA SULLIVAN: Hold on a second.
19	That's another thing that's really difficult
20	because the various tables are separated by several pages of
21	contracts, which makes it a lot more difficult to review this.

24	sorry. That's -36; -34 is more pages. It's under

17	you on that, and thank you.
18	MARTHA SULLIVAN: And just footnote things and
19	provide an explanation.
20	PRESIDENT JOYCE ROWLAND: Thank you.
21	MARTHA SULLIVAN: so that people aren't wondering.
22	PRESIDENT JOYCE ROWLAND: Thank you.
23	MARTHA SULLIVAN: I mean, it's very simple.
24	PRESIDENT JOYCE ROWLAND: Okay. So we have no one
25	else signed up to speak on the Consent Calendar. So I need a

1	motion, second, and a roll call on the Consent Calendar.

19	PRESIDENT JOYCE ROWLAND: No.
20	Okay. Then we will move to our Executive
21	Management Report.
22	MS. MOORE: So following last month's meeting, if you
23	will recall, we had some discussion around the Consent Calendar
24	and it having items on it because the Consent Calendar requires
25	board approval in essence, action and it having items on

it that really were just for review by the board. And so we separated the contracts out on this agenda, hence the page that accompanies those contracts for board approval, which are under Section 3, Consent Calendar Items. And then separately, this section of contracts for -- just for the board's review and awareness of contracts executed per the delegation of authority.

So this is the first meeting following that change; so this may be where some of that confusion is, and perhaps we will look to put those further down on the agenda so they don't appear as though -- you know, that they are -- that they are the same item. But what you have in your packet is the, kind of, cover sheet of the contracts, followed by the contracts relevant to that listing and group under Item 3. And then, those under Item 4.

But as with -- and again, we do -- the agenda does post 10 days prior to the board meeting, and we make our best effort to include all items that we are anticipating will be before the board for approval, as well as review. But sometimes -- and it can be due to the need to rebid. It could be due to even the workload of staff, depending on if we get a lot of responses to anything in particular; you know, the volume and things like that, the schedule can get adjusted.

In this case, both the Consent Calendar, the three contracts that were removed, as well as, then, on -- for

2.

your review, you do not have 23-002, ride safety inspections, or 23-036, the fair street banner installation. And that is — the ride safety inspection, again, fell into a cate——— we didn't receive any bids to our initial solicitation so we have had to put that back out to bid. And then, again, on the —— on this, for the —— for fair street banners, again, this is the contract wasn't executed enough for it to be in the board —— contained in the board packets. So those two items, they aren't in your packet for review. So again, just a big change from last month.

Next month, there will be an extensive list of contracts as we bring forward a lot of our fair time contracts as well; vendors, concessionaires, Midway entertainment, which we will get to later in the meeting as well.

I also wanted to just address the previous request that Ms. Sullivan had regarding hosting the tent vigil and author, and I left a message. Hopefully, Ms. Sullivan, you had a chance to hear that prior to the meeting. But Director Mosier and I have been working on that.

Unfortunately, the timing doesn't work for -- in the city of Del Mar with things that they have going on related to their -- kind of their public arts program and things like that. And then, now that our fall event, the fall event here at the fairgrounds, has really come together, looking at dates for -- because we also said about possibly hosting, you know, here at

the fairgrounds in the future and possibly even doing that around -- for example, around Homeless Persons' Memorial Day, which is actually on the winter solstice, December 21st. It's a national awareness day. So anyhow, we are continuing to work on that.

Just as a reminder -- I mentioned it last

month -- but our new Chief Communications Officer -
gentleman's name is Tristan Holman (spelled phonetically) -
will be joining the team next week so we'll have a proper

introduction of him at our May board meeting.

We recently launched a new online portal for temporary employee recruitment and onboarding that streamlines the process, makes it online for people to apply for jobs at the fair. And so that is now open, jobs are available. Folks can go to SDFair.com to apply for those. And looking forward to all those who want to participate and work at the fair this coming year.

Just as a reminder, and until further notice, which could possibly come through SB 544, for directors, but until further notice -- and if, for some reason, that doesn't get signed into effect -- the waiver of location disclosure, posting and public access to attend meetings via, like, telephone or video conference, currently that sunsets on June 30th. But SB -- so Senate Bill 544 was introduced, which would continue to waive that -- it looks like potentially

indefinitely, allowing for that -- that greater participation.

So we'll keep you apprised of that as we watch that move

through at the state level.

Please watch your emails for a Doodle poll of sorts. I don't know exactly what process we're going to use or what platform, but we've got various community meetings we will be looking to schedule over the coming -- over the coming weeks, before the May board meeting. I thought it would be easiest to see because it's so many that we'll be trying to schedule and see all of your availability and calendar, and then we'll match up for which committee meetings for that.

And then, we are working to schedule the Race Track Authority and State Race Track Leasing Commission meetings. It is a challenge to line up the calendars of not only the district, but also there are three other state agencies that are represented on those two bodies, Department of Finance, Department of General Services, and the Department of Food and Agriculture. So it can be quite challenging in terms that our years are very different. For example, they are in year-end; whereas, we are ramping up for the fair. It's very heavy budget time and things like that.

But in addition to that, and while there's no required meeting date for either the RTA or the State Race

Track Leasing Commission, we do try to be consistent with that; so typically, in February or March of each year. However, in a

2.

year such as this -- and later on in the agenda we have, for example, the Breeders' Cup terms, really trying to schedule that when we have all of the relevant information to bring forward to that body at one time; so working to schedule that to occur in the coming months. And as soon as we do have that schedule, we will post the date and time on our website; on the Del Mar Fairgrounds website.

And then, also, just as a -- as we continually work to be more sustainable and efficient, we have been exploring -- so as board members return to the boardroom, we've been exploring ways to also streamline our packet and communications. And so, while many of you join also, you know, via remote access on a monthly basis, but a format so that we aren't producing these binders of papers on a monthly basis but in essence going to a tablet or electronic version, even at the meetings, which would also give you access to historic information, you know, bylaws, policies as we're developing them, and have that all at your fingertips for each meeting.

PRESIDENT JOYCE ROWLAND: So it's a board portal?

And so we'll have some more information about really targeting that to be after the fair; so we're probably looking August or September board meeting to roll that out.

MS. MOORE: Uh-huh.

PRESIDENT JOYCE ROWLAND: So if you have a specific one in mind, could you talk to us about it at some point or

1	give us some insight about what it is because we probably have
2	a bunch of them that they're already using.
3	MS. MOORE: Well, and in this case, it most likely
4	will be something, as we have transitioned to Teams, being able
5	to provide it through that platform. But, yes.
6	PRESIDENT JOYCE ROWLAND: Okay.
7	MS. MOORE: So I will have more information next
8	month. We've just we've been exploring how that can look,
9	what that structure would look like.
10	And then, with that, that's kind of operational
11	updates.
12	We do have some construction project updates so
13	I will have Chief Administrative Officer Melinda Carmichael
14	come up to provide you with an update on those.
15	PRESIDENT JOYCE ROWLAND: It's not raining.
16	MS. MEAD: Thank goodness.
17	MS. MOORE: No weeks today.
18	MS. CARMICHAEL: (Audio indecipherable.)
19	COURT REPORTER: Henry?
20	PRESIDENT JOYCE ROWLAND: Is her mic on?
21	MR. RIVERA: Julia, I have to mute you. Stand by.
22	COURT REPORTER: I can't hear her.
23	PRESIDENT JOYCE ROWLAND: Oh. Hold on. We're going
24	to change the camera angle? Is that what
25	MR. RIVERA: We're working on it right now.

1 PRESIDENT JOYCE ROWLAND: Okav. 2. COURT REPORTER: I cannot hear her on her mic, Henry. 3 MS. CARMICHAEL: (Audio indecipherable.) 4 Ah. Ta dah. Okay. 5 So CCA, California Construction Authority, has 6 gone out for bid, and we have awarded a contract to SWCS, who 7 will be tying in the AC units and HVAC so that that can be operational for us. 8 Also on some other HVAC-related projects is 9 DMTC's Executive Office, their AC went out last year during the 10 11 warm -- warm months so we have been working to get that in 12 place. So CCA has had the final bid walks last week and so we 13 should be moving forward with that, getting proposals and being 14 able to fix their HVAC on that -- that particular building. 15 And as a side note, while we are having our 16 facility assessment going on right now, which is going very 17 well and we do anticipate having some results in the next 18 couple of months, some other things that we have identified are 19 our HVAC in our own administrative buildings. And there will be some further needs, but we will share that comprehensive 20 list at a later date. 21 Per our last budget meeting when we shared our 22 23 capital expenditures, we had budgeted 1.1 million for asphalt repair; so we have about 212 acres on fairgrounds proper, along 24 25 with across the street, that we are looking at getting for the

2.

repair. But we are going to take a phased approach, and we're not just going to rip it all out, but we're going to go through and rip out, grade, and backfill the areas that are allegatoring. And then do some crack -- it's called crack repair, where we will be backfilling in the cracks, filling in potholes, and then putting over a cover onto areas that can be -- withstand, you know, for a little bit longer. So we will get as much as we possibly can within that budget and then plan for future years. And we do have a plan to probably expend another 100-K every year, just for annual maintenance of it. So once we get it to the state where we think it's in good condition, then we'll keep it on a repair list from a preventative maintenance standpoint, go forward.

And then, lastly, we have our front-side housing demolition project that's going on. And that has a little bit of complication to it in that our telecom equipment is located in that building. So we have been working with some structural designers and such to figure out do we maintain that without shutting down our telecom equipment. And we have a good plan, and we are moving forward. It will be demoed and we will leave that section of the building so we will have a two-story little building of telecom through this year; and then, post-horseracing, we will be taking that top level down and roofing it and just making it a storage facility of telecom equipment, for lack of better words. So that will be ongoing, but that

will give us some space.

As you all know, front-side housing is very important to DMTC for housing of trainers and caregivers to their horses; so that will be an area that we will have set up with proper facilities, which will include the electrical, water and sewer systems so that they can either set up bunk housing or some type of housing for their folks that need to stay on grounds.

Any questions that I can answer for you? PRESIDENT JOYCE ROWLAND: Thank you.

MS. CARMICHAEL: All right. Thank you.

MS. MOORE: And then, I would just add as an update or on top of that is just in terms of the equestrian center or Horsepark. So the HITS -- you recall we assigned that agreement to HITS Del Mar Leasing, LLC -- so HITS, their CEO, just reached out to just kind of give an update to let everybody know that the renovations at Horsepark continue. And even though the weather hasn't been an ally, they are -- they really are, you know, committed to and working through. And their goal is to have things in place and complete, and they are planning to host a kind of grand opening celebration on July 15th. So there'll be more information coming on that, in terms of invitations to all of you to join them for that. And that will be, like I said, on Saturday, July 15th.

And just as a reminder, they -- that contract

was previously approved by this board but with some express conditions in it. So once those conditions are met -- and we're currently working through that with HITS -- then they'll receive written notification from me, which will then -- and we'll work on that official starting date; but we're targeting that being July 15th for the official start date of their -- the first initial five-year terms of that agreement.

And then, lastly, as well, we have a save-the-date announcement going out for our Water Quality Improvement Project celebration and tour, and we are targeting the summer months for that for this summer. And so, anyhow, so you'll have that coming -- forthcoming and so, again, just keep an eye out in your email for a couple of these announcements coming directly to you.

And so, that's it on construction projects.

And then, in terms of industry news and updates. So the CDFA collaborative exchange happened just shortly after the March board meeting. There are a number of pieces of legislation that are currently being tracked for the industry, one of which, which I had discussed at the -- at our March board meeting, having to do with funding for -- it was a budget change proposal, or you hear the term "BCP" at the state level, to adjust the funding, the AB 1499, or thought of as the new fair funds, or it's also referred to as the gross sales funds. But this is the generation of, you know, three-quarters of one

percent of sales tax generated on state-designated fairgrounds, 1 2. which include all of the District Ag Associations and the 3 county fairs. In essence, we're all state-designated under 4 Food and Ag Code. Anyhow, but to direct a portion of those funds for F and A operations. So that's AB 624; so we will 5 6 keep an eye on that. 7 I mentioned to you Senate Bill 544, regarding There is also a new senate bill, 416, 8 the Bagley-Keene. regarding lead certification for new or major renovation of 9 buildings, anything that's over 10,000 square feet where the 10 11 design documents are initiated after January 1st of 2024. So 12 we're also keeping our eyes -- we'll be keeping our eyes on 13 that as well. 14 Additionally, there is Assembly Bill 1567, regarding safe drinking water and bond monies that may be 15 16 available for the network of fairgrounds for improvements 17 because we serve as evacuation centers. So again, these are 18 all just continue to monitor, and I'll provide updates. 19 As well as there's Assembly Bill 574, regarding 20 broadband on fairgrounds. Sorry, I need to turn and look this 21 way sometimes to see the camera. 22 Anyhow, and so -- and this is especially in some 23 of the rural areas of fairgrounds but may, perhaps, be applicable to some things here as well; so we'll continue, like 24 25 I said, to monitor those.

Also at that collaborative exchange, State

Treasurer Fiona Ma and her team joined us. She has been a

proponent and advocate for fairs since her time even in the

Legislature. And she was there to introduce some savings

programs that they are interested in rolling out information on

at fairs. We've been in contact with her office on that. But

it really -- what they are presenting was very mission-aligning

for us, as an organization, as well, especially when I think

of, you know, accessibility. And we've talked about

accessibility not just being the physical space of the

fairgrounds, but affordability in some ways as well.

And so these savings programs -- like I said,

there are four of them, two of which specifically target children, from newborns all the way through high school, a couple of different programs that are in there. There's also a program for small businesses for helping to provide, in essence, employee savings accounts, where those are lacking for health care services. And then, a program that will provide for those diagnosed with disabilities prior to age 26 to actually be able to create a savings account that doesn't, then, impact their disability benefits and things.

Anyhow, so hopefully, they will be able to participate in the San Diego County Fair. Keep in mind that many of the fairs, when they first pitched this idea, are a weekend long, maybe two weekends long, get into some of bigger

ones, it's four weekends; so how we go about being able to support those initiatives as well.

2.

We also had the Appointments Secretary Office also came, not the Appointment Secretary, herself, but her team, and specifically those that are working on the District Ag Association appointments. Same message that it has been. They are continuing to focus on boards that do not have quorums or are having quorum issues. And at this time, there's about 15 of the 54 DAA boards that they are focused on, and they are trying to address kind of two to three of those at a time, needing to address those before, then, they'll move on, set their sights on reappointments. And so, in the meantime, on behalf of the governor, thank you very much for your service, for your continued service. Again, if we have any further updates.

Also at that collaborative exchange was the CDFA, or Department of Food and Agriculture's audit office, just continuous emphasis on areas that they focus on with regard to compliance audits. But I think this really supports our efforts regarding pol- -- because a lot of it being around policies; so what are your policies and are you following those policies. So just really supporting in that area as well.

And then, kind of lastly with that, following the January collaborative exchange, several of my colleagues worked with the Department of Tax and Fee Administration to

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produce some informational materials that we'll be sharing with our fair vendors to encourage the proper reporting of those gross sales on state-designated fairgrounds. And actually, the gentleman with Department of Tax and Fee Administration who oversees the program, the AB 1499 funds, he and his team did a great job. So we have a short video that we'll now be able to share with our various vendors, as well as, then, the industry.

We developed some, you know, fliers and informational materials that we'll be able to include in contracts and to hand out to hopefully ensure that everybody is reporting that information correctly. Because unfortunately, we cannot get access to -- we cannot receive information of who is or is not reporting that information because there are privacy issues around that information. So instead, really focusing on our fair vendors, initially; and then, we'll start to focus on other events that take place on fairgrounds throughout the year.

And then, this month's collaborative exchange, which would have been in person in Sacramento, actually got moved to the beginning of May, and in part because at our most recent one, there was just a lot of discussion around, you know, sort of the future of the industry, the various — whether it's the Department of Food and Agriculture, it's our, you know, our trade association of California Fairs Alliance, or even some of our Joint Powers Authority, such as California

Fair Service Authority, California Construction Authority, and 1 2 so on, you know, kind of what everybody's role is in that; what 3 are our goals? Where are we as an organ- -- as an entire 4 industry, you know, focusing on the future and where to be. 5 And so, like I said, that got moved to the beginning of May 6 because we'll actually be focusing and really approaching it 7 from a strategic planning standpoint of for the industry. So we'll have more information following that meeting next month. 8 Next week, the end of next week, I will be out. 9 I'll be attending the IAFE Management Conference in St. Louis. 10 11 That is in an approved state, as of this time. And so -- which I am very much looking forward to it because really, it's the 12 13 first opportunity in many years to engage, kind of, outside of California with our industry. So I'll have more information on 14 that. 15 And then, also, too, just want to make the board 16 17 I'm sure many of you have seen some of the headlines in 18 the news and things like that regarding the Shasta County Fair 19 and their junior livestock auction, and, in essence -- and the little girl and her goat. And just want to reassure this board 20 21 that a situation like that wouldn't happen at our fair, and in part, because we are not that style of an auction, with regard 22 23 to it being a termination auction in that way. And so, but it's clearly picking up a lot of headlines, and I would 24 25 anticipate that there may be some regulations and things like

1	that, you know, coming out of this in the future around junior
2	livestock auctions.
3	And with that, that concludes my management
4	report.
5	MS. BARKETT: Carlene, I just wanted to state that I
6	really appreciate having in our board packet the contracts.
7	We've never had that transparency with the full contract
8	before, and I applaud you in making that change. Thank you.
9	MS. MOORE: You're welcome.
10	And I was just going to and that is just,
11	again, that ongoing effort so that you are aware. And it is
12	not the full contract. Otherwise it would be much bigger.
13	[Multiple speakers.]
14	MS. MOORE: the important pieces because so much
15	of it is standard language documents that are included, but
16	thank you for the recognition.
17	PRESIDENT JOYCE ROWLAND: Right.
18	MS. BARKETT: It was great. And I actually learned a
19	lot from reading through them.
20	MS. MOORE: Right.
21	MS. BARKETT: I did.
22	PRESIDENT JOYCE ROWLAND: Director Gelfand.
23	MR. GELFAND: Yeah. I'm just curious about how you
24	actually do it; like, how many staff are involved, and, you
25	know, to what extent is there back and forth with legal. I

mean, it's a lot of contracts to review and negotiate and enter 1 2 into. How do you actually do it? How many people involved? 3 MS. MOORE: Well, keep -- there are a lot of people 4 involved. And quite honestly, I mean, I would say that 5 there -- when you really think about it, there's probably two-6 to three-dozen people involved because even the contracting 7 process, our supervisors and managers and department heads are a part of that process as well, as they prepare materials and 8 things like that for -- and we have a process of contract 9 10 requests and then how that goes through an approval process by 11 members of the executive team. Also our Director of Finance, 12 where we -- you know, within the budget, assessment of that. 13 And then, depending on that, yes, there's sometimes or 14 oftentimes a legal portion of that that's looked at as well. 15 We have a contracts team, a contracts unit, that 16 then is specifically preparing primarily the standard service-17 types of agreements. A lot of the, again, the standards of 18 like judging agreements or commercial, you know, exhibitor or 19 concessionaires, those are done within those departments because it's just a standard template that is issued. So --20 but it really -- and then, you know, bringing all that 21 together. And then Donna, party of one over here, bringing --22 23 helping to bring together the documents and things like that. But it truly is a group effort throughout the organization. 24 25 PRESIDENT JOYCE ROWLAND: Director Mosier, I think

you had a question as well? 1 2. MR. MOSIER: Yeah. I just wanted to thank you for 3 verifying that our livestock auctions do not follow the Shasta 4 Fair model, and that is a very unfortunate circumstance I 5 thought trouble -- should trouble all the fairs in California. 6 MS. MOORE: Yes. 7 MR. MOSIER: So thank you for clarifying what our position is. 8 MS. MOORE: You're welcome. 9 PRESIDENT JOYCE ROWLAND: Okay. We have one member 10 11 of the public signed up to speak on the Executive Management 12 Report. That's Martha Sullivan. 13 MARTHA SULLIVAN: Yeah. Hello, again. This is 14 Martha Sullivan. I first wanted to just thank CEO Moore for her 15 16 update about trying to show the tent vigil. We can certainly 17 see if the December memorial date might work. Frankly, you try to do that in a more publicly-available location. But we can 18 19 start to talk. Another possibility is October 10th, which is World Homeless Day. 20 The other thing I just wanted to point out, and 21 22 this comes from several years as a contract officer for the 23 State Public Utilities Commission, probably, that I'm a little obsessed about this, but I do want to point out that in the 24 25 table that lists the individual project agreements with the

California Construction Authority, the Wyland project is not 1 2. included in that table, but it's the first project agreement 3 that follows the table. So just as a proofreading nudge to 4 you. 5 Thank you. 6 PRESIDENT JOYCE ROWLAND: Okay. Thank you very much. 7 So we'll now move into General Business. And the first item on General Business is a presentation by the 8 Don Diego Scholarship Foundation. 9 ASHLEY COLBURN MCCAUGHAN: Good afternoon, everyone. 10 11 Again, my name is Ashley Col- -- or McCaughan, and I am the 12 Executive Director of Don Diego. Everything is in full swing right now. We had 13 more than 50 applications this year for our scholarships, and 14 15 we're excited that we're going to be interviewing them starting 16 next week, and then, the following week for our junior 17 livestock auction scholarships. So we are preparing for that. 18 And currently, we are fundraising for our Plant*Grow*Eat 19 Program that we work with here at the fairgrounds. And we are able to supply buses for Title 1 schools. Buses range from 20 21 \$300 to \$500, and so we are currently seeking donations to help us pay so that we can get as many students here and teach them 22 23 about agriculture education during the Plant*Grow*Eat Program. And the most exciting news is we have finally 24 25 booked our main event fundraiser of the year, which is our

annual Gala, and it is going to be on July 1st. And at this 1 2 event, we are able to honor all of the scholars. And then, it 3 continues on with a concert by Alabama. So we're extremely 4 excited for that. This is open for anyone who wants to 5 purchase a ticket. Again, the proceeds go to supporting our 6 scholarships, and we'll have more information coming on 7 DonDiegoScholarship.org, and tickets will be on sale starting 8 in May. So at the next meeting, I'm sure I'll update you 9 more on that. But for anyone interested, it's a great time to 10 11 come and, you know, see the amazing things that these students 12 are off to doing. They are all high school seniors, and some 13 of them are really high achievers so I'm looking forward to the 14 interviews next week so we can hear from all of them. 15 Thanks so much. PRESIDENT JOYCE ROWLAND: Thank you. 16 17 Any questions from the board? 18 All right. Thank you. 19 ASHLEY COLBURN MCCAUGHAN: Thank you. 20 PRESIDENT JOYCE ROWLAND: So we have no one from the 21 public signed up to -- on the presentation on Don Diego so 22 we'll move to our Comprehensive Policies Development and 23 Review. MS. MOORE: And if I can just clarify in terms of the 24 25 previous public comment, the Wyland Agreement can be found on

1 | page 35 of your packet.

2.

In terms of the comprehensive policies, so at last month's meeting, we approved policies, and today we are introducing two new policies to you. And then, one thing that we will be including each month is the table of contents so that for your awareness, as well as the public, of kind of where we're at, you know, progress of. So as policies are introduced, they'll be in draft stage. And then, at such time that they are adopted, they'll be updated. So this will be a continually, you know, changing document until such time as we are complete through the entire process.

So at this time, unless if there's any -- you guys had a chance to read over the policies, if there's any feedback, again, we'll come next month for any additional input, as well as then take this to committee to be able to look at. And then, based on our timeline of things, won't be back again until August, where we'll remind everybody of where we're at on things, just from the summer break due to the fair.

PRESIDENT JOYCE ROWLAND: Okay. We have one member of the public signed up to speak on our policies development and review; that's Martha Sullivan.

MARTHA SULLIVAN: Hi. It's Martha Sullivan again.

I am curious about when the section on reporting wrongdoings is expected to be available for review.

MS. MOORE: The section on what?

1	PRESIDENT JOYCE ROWLAND: Wrongdoing, reporting
2	wrongdoing.
3	MS. BARKETT: Yeah. 2.05.
4	PRESIDENT JOYCE ROWLAND: Right.
5	MS. MOORE: Right now, that's in legal review. So
6	that's which is why it's still in draft. So at this time
7	we may have it for next month's meeting.
8	MARTHA SULLIVAN: Okay. Thank you.
9	MS. MOORE: We've previously brought that I'm
10	sorry. We've previously brought that forward. I think it was
11	at the January or February board meeting. And then, just with
12	some other things, hadn't gotten back to that yet. So, again,
13	we will bring which is why it just sits in draft. Nothing
14	more has been done because it has not been brought back to the
15	board for their review.
16	Okay. So we'll move to our next item, which is
17	the DMTC Report.
18	And I think, Director Barkett, you're up?
19	MS. BARKETT: Thank you. Well, at this point, I'd
20	like to ask Josh to come forward. And I want to congratulate
21	the Del Mar Thoroughbred Club for being awarded the host
22	position for the 2024 Breeders' Cup. We're so excited that
23	it's going to be back at Del Mar. And in light of this, I just
24	want to point out something.
25	Looking at the economic impact from year to year

2.

of when we have our fall and summer race meets, when we add in the Breeders' Cup, that adds a third more to the economic impact. So what is expected in 2024 is actually 300 million, which is amazing because 100 million of it for the two-day Breeders' Cup is equivalent to a third of that economic impact to San Diego. So that's very exciting for us. And plus, the payment on the bonds, it makes us very happy that we're able to make that with your help. So thank you very much.

And I'm going to turn it over to you.

MR. CAPLAN: Thank you, Director Barkett, for those kind words. And good afternoon to district directors and staff.

As Director Barkett said, we are extremely excited to be hosting the Breeders' Cup World Championships on November 1st and 2nd. This will be the third time that Del Mar has been awarded the Breeders' Cup. We last held the event in 2021, and this will be the third time in eight years. And for those of you have been to the Breeders' Cup, it is truly the Superbowl of horseracing and an international event.

Director Barkett spoke to the economic impact.

A hundred million dollars for the week long of activities to

Del Mar and the surrounding community. That's filling hotel

rooms, restaurants, and other local businesses. And when you

combine that with the economic impact from DMTC's summer and

fall race meets, in 2024, the economic impact to Del Mar and

the surrounding community will be over \$300 million; so that's 1 2. thousands of jobs; again, hotels, restaurants, really keeping 3 the local community going. 4 In terms of the direct financial impact to the 5 district, the Breeders' Cup is held within our fall meet, which 6 the District receives compensation for. So on top of the fall 7 meet, rent, and food and beverage revenues that the district receives, the Breeders' Cup provides the district a \$600,000 8 facility rental payment for the two-day event, and I'll note 9 that is a 50 percent increase from the facility rental payment 10 11 that was paid to the district in 2021. So from \$400- to 12 \$600,000. And then, a \$200,000 rev share in walk-up F&B 13 concessions. So the district will receive in 2024, for the two-day Breeders' Cup, an \$800,000 guarantee, which, you know, 14 as Director Barkett said, is terrific for the district's bottom 15 16 line and the repayment of our bonds. 17 So again, we're excited. 2024 can't get here The '23 Breeders' Cup will be held at Santa Anita 18 soon enough. 19 so it will be back-to-back years if the event is in Southern California. 20 21 So with that, I am happy to answer any questions 22 that you may have. 23 PRESIDENT JOYCE ROWLAND: Director Gelfand. The \$200,000 on food and beverage, how 24 MR. GELFAND: 25 does that relate to the normal contract for food and beverage

1	during race season?
2	MR. CAPLAN: So the normal contract with food and
3	beverage, all of race meet F&B net revenue are retained by the
4	district. None of that falls to DMTC. The way the Breeders'
5	Cup operates, they received the net revenues for food and
6	beverage at, you know, 90 percent, or basically, all the
7	facilities they operate at, except for Del Mar. And we said to
8	the Breeders' Cup, "It's not our money. That's it's the
9	district's money." So we were able to negotiate a \$200,000
10	guarantee on walk-up F&B concessions that the district will
11	receive in 2024. And that guarantee was reached in 2017 and
12	2021.
13	MS. MOORE: And if I could, for just a moment, to
14	clarify. This is the walk-up, so concession-stand sales,
15	versus catering.
16	MR. GELFAND: So the Premier arrangement stays in
17	place. This is on top of that?
18	MR. CAPLAN: Correct.
19	MS. BARKETT: Yes.
20	MS. MOORE: Correct.
21	MR. GELFAND: Perfect. Thank you.
22	PRESIDENT JOYCE ROWLAND: Any other questions? And
23	I'm looking at the screen, too, to see if there are any from
24	the folks who are Zooming in.
25	Okay. We have one member of the public who

signed up to speak before we have any actions, and that's
Martha Sullivan.

MARTHA SULLIVAN: Hi. This is Martha Sullivan again.

I just want to go on record and be clear with everybody that California is now on its 24th racehorse death reported by the California Horseracing Board in 103 days of the 2023 racing season. So that's a dead horse about every four days. Not anything to be proud of.

As you've heard me say before, no legitimate sport would tolerate the deaths of 23 of its athletes in 103 days in just one state.

I also shared with you, you have in the back of your board packet an ongoing animal neglect investigation by the San Diego County Division of Animal Services of a horse ranch just outside of Rancho Santa Fe that's owned by racehorse owners and breeders who are long-time licensees of the California Horse Racing Board, Debra Barkley, who I met with, who also operated EAS Equine Alliance. There've been several news reports by several news organizations about this, overhead drone coverage, which shows the really horrific conditions that horses are living in. They're lame. There's visible open wounds on horses. It was a really, really tragic situation. And again, it's not a good look for horseracing. These are long-time licensed racehorse owners and breeders who are keeping horses in horrific conditions.

1	MS. O'LEARY: Ms. Sullivan, your time is up.
2	MARTHA SULLIVAN: in Del Mar Race Track.
3	PRESIDENT JOYCE ROWLAND: Thank you.
4	And we do have an action item here that's
5	pending. Do you want to introduce the action item?
6	MR. RIVERA: We actually have one more member.
7	PRESIDENT JOYCE ROWLAND: Oh, I'm sorry.
8	MS. O'LEARY: I just got it.
9	PRESIDENT JOYCE ROWLAND: Oh. Just got it. Okay.
10	Thank you. I thought I
11	Yes, we have one more member of the public
12	signed up to speak, Bob Gregson.
13	BOB GREGSON: Yes, hello. Thank you.
14	I certainly wanted to call in in support of the
15	Del Mar Thoroughbred Club, the track, and not only the two
16	seasons that we have, but the Breeders' Cup, as well. It's
17	worth a tremendous amount of notoriety, on top of just revenues
18	at Del Mar. My hotel benefits probably in the neighborhood of
19	almost \$2-and-a-half million to \$3 million from a normal track
20	season, and the Breeders' Cup brings in probably close to
21	another million dollars just for the hotel.
22	I know I speak with a lot of people at the track
23	quite a bit, and the lengths that they go to to protect the
24	horses, I think is amazing what they've done and the investment
25	that they've made in the track and the trainers and the

1	physicians to make the sport as safe as possible.
2	PRESIDENT JOYCE ROWLAND: Thank you.
3	MS. BARKETT: First, I'd like to say that I'd like
4	to thank the Del Mar Thoroughbred Club for always thinking of
5	the district and for negotiating the deal that they did with
6	the terms this year for us. It's crucial to get back on board,
7	and I see the Del Mar Fairgrounds just, you know, continuing to
8	climb up out of the Covid era, and so it's nice to see
9	everything coming back, you know, the way it used to be. So
10	thank you very much.
11	At this time, I would like to ask for the
12	approval of the board, according to the terms outlined in the
13	letter to Carlene and the district staff recommendation, that
14	we approve the Breeders' Cup return in 2024.
15	PRESIDENT JOYCE ROWLAND: Great. So I will need a
16	motion.
17	You're making that motion?
18	MS. BARKETT: Yes, I am.
19	PRESIDENT JOYCE ROWLAND: I need a second.
20	MR. MOSIER: Second.
21	PRESIDENT JOYCE ROWLAND: Second, Director Mosier.
22	We need roll call, please.
23	MR. GELFAND: Discussion, first.
24	PRESIDENT JOYCE ROWLAND: I'm sorry.
25	MR. GELFAND: I'd like a little clarity on page 61,

1	the future-year option portion of this. Because the way it's
2	written maybe it's not ambiguous, but by approving this
3	motion, we are not simultaneously, without discussion,
4	extending the lease beyond 2025?
5	MS. BARKETT: Correct.
6	PRESIDENT JOYCE ROWLAND: No, it's not.
7	MS. BARKETT: Yeah.
8	MS. MOORE: It's simply that Breeders' Cup would have
9	the option to return
10	PRESIDENT JOYCE ROWLAND: In one of those years.
11	MS. BARKETT: In one of those years, yes. But that's
12	not part of the motion.
13	MR. GELFAND: Thank you.
14	PRESIDENT JOYCE ROWLAND: All right. Any other
15	discussion?

So we went on 17 sale -- the big announcement this month is that we went on sale 18 with our Grandstand shows and our fair admission and our 19 parking tickets last week. I just want to remind everybody that all of these contracts are authorized under the CEO's 20 21 delegation of authority, but we will bring these forward for 22 your information next month with the complete Grandstand 23 lineup. We went with a little bit of an abridged version of an announcement last week and on sale, which I'll explain in more 24 25 detail. But we have to date sold 5,496 tickets to the select

group of shows so we're pretty excited about getting that ball rolling.

So just a quick timeline. Our official announced date with media support -- we had, of course, social media and then radio advertisements, as well -- started on April 4th. And then, we had a fair insider pre-sale so we eblasted all of the people that are on our mailing list with a special code, and they could have first access to tickets on April 6th and 7th. And then, the on sale to the general public happened on April 8th and is still ongoing.

admission so you do not have to buy fair admission separately; that's part of the package. And then, we will also have an additional announcement that's coming in probably around May 1st because of conflicts with Coachella and Stagecoach and all of that. We're kind of prohibited from making a couple of announcements until that music festival is concluded. And then, of course, I mentioned the parking and admission were on sale now.

So who is going to be on the Grandstand stage this summer? Well, we've got quite a diverse lineup from what we had in the past. So June 7th, opening night, we're going to open with a bang, and that's with Train, who we've had here a couple of times in the past.

And then, June 9th. This is the first time that

it's been announced. The official announcement hasn't even gone out yet. I didn't know for sure if we were even going to be able to talk about it at this meeting. But on Friday,

June 9th, we are going to have comedian Kevin Hart appear on the Grandstand. Pretty excited about that, obviously. We've never had him here before, and I'm not sure he even plays fairs very often; so we're pretty excited about that. Those tickets will actually go on sale this Friday. They have not been on sale yet so, like I said, this is the first announcement we've had. So we have an official announcement that'll be going out tomorrow. And then, on sale will start on the 8th.

And then, we have our Dias de la Familia the first three Sundays of the fair with La Adictiva. Leonard Skynyrd is going to be appearing on June 17th. Grupo Bronco will be here on June 18th. Boyz II Men will be here June 22nd. Stephen Marley with Hirie will be here on June 24th. Los Tigris del Norte will be here on June 25th. Randy Houser, with a special TBA co-headliner that we'll be announcing right around May 1st, will be here on the 28th.

Alabama, near and dear to my heart, my personal favorite, will be here July 1st. Switchfoot will be back on July 3rd. And then, we have a couple of TBA announcements, again, that will be coming out later for June 14th and June -- I think it's 29th as well. So stay tuned. More to come. So very excited about having those on sale. You can go to our

1 | website, SDFair.com to get all the information on those.

And then, I also wanted to give everyone a heads up that we have finished booking our Paddock Concert Series, which happens every night at 8:00 p.m. in the paddock, except for two days this year, which we'll talk about. But June 7th, we have an Earth, Wind & Fire tribute. June 8th is L.A.Vation, which is a U2 tribute.

June 9th, one of my personal favorites -- if you didn't see them last year -- Symphonic Sinatra. He looks and sounds just like a young Frank Sinatra with a whole symphony orchestra in the background. We're actually going to be having two matinee shows this year, back by popular demand. So that will be at 4:00 p.m. on Friday, June 9th. June 10th -- I'm so sorry that Fred's not here to announce it, but he made the suggestion to us, and we're so happy that he did because they are such a popular group -- and that's The Scarlet Opera will be here on June 10th.

The Best of Both Worlds, a Van Halen tribute, Springsteen Experience, Cor, which is a Stone Temple Pilots tribute. Our second matinee will be Super Diamond, which is happening on June 16th. Dr. Crue is a Motley Crue tribute. On Father's Day, we've got Nirvanish, a Nirvana tribute. On June 21st, we have Vegas McGraw, which is a Tim McGraw tribute. One June 22nd, the Fab Four, who appeared on our Grandstand in the past, is a Beatles tribute. That'll be in the paddock.

June 23rd is Eagle Eyes. June 24th is our Gospel Festival; so 1 2. that will be Myron Butler, with special guest Kelontae Gavin. 3 Hopefully, I didn't butcher that. 4 June 25th is I Am King; it's a Michael Jackson 5 tribute because that is the anniversary of his untimely 6 passing. June 28th is Mariachi Rock Revolution. June 29th is 7 Taken by the Sky, a Fleetwood Mac tribute. June 30th is Hysteria, a Dep Leopard tribute. July 1st is Woody and the 8 Long Boards. They're like a surf band. 9 July 2nd we will have, as part of our Dia de la 10 11 Familia -- we're not going to have an act on the Grandstand 12 because that has historically been the most popular attendance 13 day of the fair, next to July 4th, and that's that final 14 Sunday. But we will have a Hispanic artist on the Paddock, Jorge Medina. July 3rd is The Green. And then, July 4th, we 15 16 will have Kiss the Sky, a Jimmie Hendrix tribute, hopefully 17 reprising his very popular Star Spangled Banner at that show. 18 I'm looking at Henry. He knows why. 19 But anyways, we had a great team working on 20 these announcements and these on sale, and I just can't thank everybody enough. We went with our new digital ticketing 21 22 system online for the first time. Very excited about that. 23 And it just went really well. So if everybody has a chance to look at the website, it just looks terrific. 24 25 Also, our Carnival on sale is coming up.

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using a new system called Blast Pass RFID Ticketing. That will go on sale on April 22nd. So the earlier you buy, the cheaper the tickets are. So Aril 22nd through May 14th, you will receive 50 percent bonus tickets, on top of your purchase you buy during that period of time. May 15th to June 6th, that goes down to a 25 percent bonus. And then, of course, once the fair starts on June 7th, it's just our regular retail price.

We'll have our Pay-One-Price unlimited ride days

We'll have our Pay-One-Price unlimited ride days back again this year on Wednesdays and Thursdays. Again, the cheapest time to get them is in advance of the fair. So they will be \$45 April 22nd through June 6th. Fair time, that goes up to \$49.

But wait, there's more. Available at all 7-Elevens and Speedways in the beginning of May will be a coupon that you can receive for \$5 off of a wristband, either the pre-sale price, which makes it only \$40, or the regular price, which makes it 45 -- sorry; 44. But you have to purchase online in order to use the coupon so that's a special promotion we have coming up.

And then, festivals, special days in the Paddock. These ones are free with your fair admission. We have Out at the Fair coming on June 10th. Asian and Pacific Islander Festival will be on Saturday, June 17th. And the Gospel Festival will be June 24th.

And then, for the first time ever, in The Sound

we'll be doing our beverage festivals, and those tickets will 1 2. also go on sale April 22nd. We have our Toast of the Coast 3 Wine Festival returning to the format of 2019 and previous, 4 where we'll have the seated VIP Experience. That will include 5 food and wine pairings, as well as a general session. And 6 then, we're combining our San Diego International Beer and 7 Distilled Spirit and Cocktail Festivals into one event on Saturday, July 1st. So it'll be really fun and a really 8 special experience. The first time in The Sound, and we're 9 really excited about bringing those back. 10 11 And then, I want to tell you about the Get Out 12 There Trailblazer Challenge. So with the help of 13 Director Nejabat, we connected with San Diego County Parks, and we also reached out to California State Parks, located here in 14 15 San Diego County. And we are putting on this pre-fair 16 promotion in collaboration with those two organizations. So 17 basically, it encourages San Diegans to actually "Get Out 18 There and explore your local and regional park system. 19 So we have a couple of radio partners, thanks to the Marketing Department that helped put this together, and 20 iHeart Radio. They'll be producing a series of social videos 21 that feature on-air talent Getting Out There, around San Diego 22 23 County and encouraging San Diegans to take part in the Trailblazer Challenge. 24 25 So the way that it works is if you visit three

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different outdoor parks or recreation areas prior to the fair and then you take a photo of yourself, you hashtag our hashtag, our official hashtag, which is SDFair, and post it; and then, your final destination is, of course, the theme exhibit here at the fair. And then, you can show that and collect a little prize. I'm not sure -- it says a patch on here, but I'm not sure if it's going to be a patch or a water bottle, but it will be a nice little prize for participating in the Get Out There Challenge. So we are really excited about that, and I think it will be a lot of fun and a great way to partner with our local park system.

And then, the other thing we have going on is the Fair-Tastic Food Competition, which is really exciting. I just spoke to the Marketing Department right before this meeting, and they said we have over 30 entries in this competition from our various food vendors. So we are basically challenging our food concessionaires to come up with a new culinary creation that we can talk about in media, we can share on social media. You know, everyone comes to the fair for the food. Come on.

But we have two divisions, which are sweet and savory. And there's three classes; so either you can enter a themed item, which is in the "Get Out There" theme, which is think s'mores and outdoor cooking and things like that. There's a wow item, which really is just an item that's

Instagramable that you post a picture of or something, and everyone goes "I want that." "I want to go to the fair and get that." Think of the Jake and Charlie's Pineapples of the past; you know, how visually appealing those are.

And then, finally, there's a value item as well, so something that is offered at a reduced price or is affordable for the whole family, that kind of thing. So we're partnering with San Diego Magazine on this promotion, and Troy Johnson, here. He is a publisher of San Diego Magazine, but he's also been -- appeared as a guest judge on a number of Food Network shows, such as Guy's Grocery Games and some others.

We have media partners, including, of course,
San Diego Magazine, but 91X, Magic 92.5, and Z90.3. The
finalists are going to get promoted on social, news blogs,
website eblasts. And then, of course, on the back of our Day
Sheet this year, we're also going to have a food map. So on
the front side, you'll see a map with the entire fair to find
different attractions and things. But the back is going to be
just dedicated to food stands and where you can find your
favorite foods. So these will be featured on there.

Additionally, they'll be invited to come -- to participate in things like our Media Morning, where we bring food out and different, you know, news anchors and that kind of thing, try it. As well as our press conference that we're planning in May. So we're very excited. We're hoping to make

1	this an annual event that will be a big deal, and will kind of
2	invite our food vendors to bring their A-game to the fair every
3	year and give us lots to talk about.
4	So we have a lot of things a lot of things
5	going on; a lot of irons in the fire. Next meeting will be
6	probably mostly all about the fair, since it is our last one
7	and we have tons of things going on. You'll hear all about all
8	of our marketing and our ag and education programs, and our
9	concession new foods and new vendors and all of that kind of
10	stuff. So this is just a little taste of what's coming.
11	PRESIDENT JOYCE ROWLAND: Does anybody have any
12	MR. GELFAND: No pun intended; a little taste.
13	MS. MUELLER: Yeah. Right.
14	PRESIDENT JOYCE ROWLAND: You didn't talk about the
15	low calorie division.
16	MS. MUELLER: Yeah. Right. Well
17	PRESIDENT JOYCE ROWLAND: Get lots of exercise at the
18	fair.
19	MS. MUELLER: We take all of the calories out of the
20	food at the fair.
21	PRESIDENT JOYCE ROWLAND: Sure.
22	MR. GELFAND: I think that's a great concept. I'm
23	looking forward to some deep-fried s'mores.
24	MS. MUELLER: Yeah. Me, too. My waist is so much
25	PRESIDENT JOYCE ROWLAND: I'm right on track with
1	

1 you. 2. MS. MUELLER: All right. Well, thank you very much. 3 PRESIDENT JOYCE ROWLAND: Okay. Any questions of 4 Katie before she? 5 All right. So we have a member of the public 6 who signed up to speak on the fair report, and that's 7 Martha Sullivan. 8 MARTHA SULLIVAN: Thank you. I don't have anything. PRESIDENT JOYCE ROWLAND: Okay. And then, we move 9 into our Public Comment. And we have four members of the 10 11 public signed up to speak in our Public Comment section. And 12 the first is Martha Sullivan. MARTHA SULLIVAN: This is included at the back of 13 your packet but I really wanted to highlight it to make sure 14 that all of the directors are aware of this recent news, which 15 16 is that Ocean Breeze Farm and Barn Stalls, a 1400-acre property 17 with a decades-long history in quarter horse and thoroughbred 18 racing on the West Coast, was recently listed for sale for \$75 19 million and could be developed. So the loss of Ocean Breeze as a breeding farm would be devastating for California, which has 20 seen a decline in the number of thoroughbreds sold in the state 21 22 in recent decades. 23 According to the Jockey Club, there were 3773 registered California-bred foals in 2001, or 10 percent of the 24 25 nation's crop. The figure fell to 1302 foals in 2021, or an

estimated 6.8 percent of the nation's crop. 1 2. In addition, last December, Tom Stull, whose 3 family owned Tommy Town Thoroughbreds in Central California, 4 said he is downsizing his operation and relocating to Kentucky. 5 Stull cited a declining commercial market in California, a 6 reduced racing schedule in the state in recent years, and costs 7 as three factors. And finally, just as another sort of black eye 8 for horseracing, the owner of Ocean Breeze Farm, Reddam, is the 9 chief executive of a consumer lending company that has been the 10 11 subject of legal scrutiny for several years and was recently 12 ordered by a federal judge to pay 167 million in restitution 13 and fines. 14 So, you know, horseracing is really just not a good look at all. It's declining. It's got really 15 16 reprehensible people representing it. So it keeps circling the 17 drain. I hope you can get out of it at the end of 2025. 18 PRESIDENT JOYCE ROWLAND: Okay. So we have some 19 folks in person who also are signed up to speak. And the first person signed up is Mr. Alaya. 20 21 JACK DUCKWORTH: He went to pick up his boy at the 22 elementary school. He'll be back as soon as possible. 23 PRESIDENT JOYCE ROWLAND: Okay. So Jack Duckworth, 24 you're up. 25 So while you're coming to the podium, I'll just

remind folks that, you know, for items that aren't on the agenda, we can't debate them. We listen.

JACK DUCKWORTH: I'd like to thank you for the opportunity for hearing what I have to say.

My name is Jack Duckworth, and I have been a tenant at Surf & Turf RV Park for the last 12 years. I may be a little different than a lot of the other RVers there. I didn't buy my RV to have fun in. My wife was in her mid-stages of Alzheimer's and she was starting to wander off, and the best solution to that problem was for me to get an RV so I could keep an eye on her 24 hours a day. Now, she has since passed away. We were married 40 years; still miss her. I still wear my wedding ring.

However, a week or so ago I got a notice that said, with one line, that they're not accepting long-term tenants back in September. And I just want to let you all know that that is a significant factor in my life at my age. I'm not only in my mid-70s, I'm disabled. You could tell by my golf-club hanging here, and there was no reason indicated in that notice we got. It just said we're not accepting any long-term tenants after 21 days in the fall. And I just want you to know that, you know, this could almost be looked as elderly abuse.

Elderly abuse doesn't -- is not just down to a limited physical or sexual abuse. There's other -- many other

2.

categories. One is emotional abuse. I'm very nervous about what's going to happen to me in the fall. It's just me and a dog. I don't know what I'm going to do. And plus, I'm not strong like I used to be to be able to move easily and stuff.

I just want you to know that this decision, even though there was no reason given to us why it's taking place, has effect on personal people. And I'm not the only elderly person over there that's been a long-term tenant there. And if you are unfamiliar with elderly abuse, I mean, you can Google it. I mean, there's another reason: Financial exploitation of the elderly. I've been there 12 years. Never been late on my rent one time. Never had a problem with a neighbor. And now, I'm basically kicked out on the street, not even given a reason, and I do want to point out one other thing.

During the pandemic, when this 22nd District was struggling financially -- and that may be an understatement -- because there was no fair and there was no race track and you guys were declined on several large loans, but there was one loyal group that provided you a monthly income. Now, I don't know how you used that income or not, but we stayed two -- we didn't even have to leave in the summer. We stayed two years in a -- whole way around the clock. And I'm a loyal person.

I'm a retired teacher. I still substitute elementary school two days a week. So not only does this decision affect my housing; I substitute teach in Carlsbad for

1	a couple days a week. I can't do any more than that, but it
2	gives me a little supplemental income. Now, wherever I'm going
3	to end up might not be close to Carlsbad, and I don't drive a
4	lot anymore. But it's not only affecting my housing; it's
5	affecting my supplemental income.
6	I just want you guys to know that this affects
7	people, and there's no reason given for it. I've been a loyal
8	tenant, paid my rent, never been late, never been in a problem
9	with anybody. And now, I'm worried about myself. And I just
10	want you guys to look into this. Maybe look at exceptions.
11	Elderly people, been there over a decade.
12	I mean, I have a dear friend that works at the
13	San Diego Union Tribune and he's begging me to do a human
14	interest story on this. And I begged him, no, don't. Let me
15	see if I can get some answers from some of these people that
16	are much younger than me, probably. But I'm sure they care
17	about people. They have friends; they have families.
18	PRESIDENT JOYCE ROWLAND: Thank you. And we hear
19	you.
20	JACK DUCKWORTH: Thank you.
21	PRESIDENT JOYCE ROWLAND: The next member of the
22	public signed up to speak, we'll go back to Mr. Ayala.
23	And the time limit on speaking is two minutes.
24	JACK DUCKWORTH: Oh, we were told it's clear.
25	J.R. AYALA: Good afternoon

1 PRESIDENT JOYCE ROWLAND: It's okay. You -- you --2. J.R. AYALA: -- members of the board and everybody. 3 PRESIDENT JOYCE ROWLAND: We didn't cut you off. So. 4 J.R. AYALA: My name is J.R. Ayala. I am also a 5 tenant there at the Surf & Turf, and just want to say thank you 6 for the upgrades. They were really awesome this year, and we 7 really appreciate that. You know, we're there -- we been there for 10 years, since 2012. And we moved here, originally, 8 because of the affordability and schools. I'll try not to get 9 emotional because that was emotional hearing about one of the 10 11 fellow tenants speak. 12 So I moved here for the school for my kids. 13 And, you know, being able to live out here and afford it is 14 hard, especially when the place the Surf & Turf is and the 15 blessing that it's been to a lot of people in our lives. I 16 have thanked anybody that's involved it. I just want to say 17 thank you for that place because it does provide a special 18 place here in Del Mar. 19 As Jack said, last week, we were given a notice just basically saying they weren't going to do anymore long 20 21 And it was because you guys weren't approving no more long-term folks. Just 21 days, and then you're out. And so, 22 23 usually, it takes a while to just look the summer months, six months in advance in our case, let alone a whole school -- the 24 25 whole school, the whole upbringing, the whole, just moving.

As Jack, I've also been loyal and never late, 1 2 you know. Even helped out, moved trailers here and there for 3 the park, when asked. And it was my delight to help management 4 there and the tenants. Now, I'm just seeking for some 5 explanation, you know, like why are -- what's going on? 6 know, we do provide good revenue, and we keep the park clean 7 and speak highly of it. I just want to know where in -- I got to put on 8 my glasses here -- where in the board policies does it say the 9 10 board must approve these long-terms? When did that start 11 happening? The board minutes indicate that there's an operating agreement with the Surf & Turf -- Surf & Turf Park. 12 13 Is that agreement available on the district website? Must I 14 make a public records request to obtain a copy of the 15 agreement? 16 I'm asking that an item be put on the agenda for 17 future meetings to discuss these approvals and policies, the 18 effect that it has on all these people. And there's, like, 20 19 to 30 of us over there; some have been there, like Jack says, you know, 15-plus years. 20 21 Currently, on the website, the Surf & Turf, the 22 language reflects that in order to stay longer than three 23 weeks, you just have to fill out an application and the contract that we fill out every year. Doesn't say anything 24 25 about you guys having to approve anything; but that's what this

short notice gave -- says. There is also no mention of this in 1 2 any of the certified transcripts in you board meetings as well. 3 So we're just -- you know, just asking for some insight. You 4 know, it seems like there's new management in there now this 5 year. There's a new manager named Sam, and he seems to kind of 6 been talking this out. We're not sure if this is a way to get us out, the long-termers out, or what's going on. Is this 7 really going on? We just want some answers. 8 9 Thank you so much for you guys' time. And we 10 really appreciate it. Thank you. 11 PRESIDENT JOYCE ROWLAND: Thank you, Mr. Ayala. 12 All right. Nicole Focone. 13 MR. AYALA: If anybody has any questions, I would be 14 more than willing to ask or answer. 15 PRESIDENT JOYCE ROWLAND: Unfortunately, we can't ask 16 questions because it wasn't listed on the agenda. 17 MR. AYALA: (Indiscernible.) But I'm looking forward to future meetings and, you know, getting on the agenda for 18 19 next month. I can bring in more members. Today I helped Jack (indiscernible). So thank you guys. 20 21 PRESIDENT JOYCE ROWLAND: Yeah. We heard you. NICOLE FOCONE: Good afternoon. I am here for the 22 23 same reason as my fellow co-tenants. I don't have a long history at the Surf & Turf 24 25 Park, but I, too, work in the area, and I have uprooted from

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Los Angeles. And I have to say, I like it here. So I, too,
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     ask for clarification because we weren't given much notice. So
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     it left us, you know, thinking what could be the reasons. And
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     basically, I think that everyone said, you know, the same
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     sentiment that I have. It's a gift to be here. We are
 6
     interested in staying longer, and if that possibility can be
     made into effect, I would welcome it.
 7
